had turned into a bag of brown mushy goo. Very disgusting, need I say more? I bought him more malt balls in Pennsylvania before the trip home.

We fly into Newark and go outside to the pick up area and are looking for a green Camaro. After a few minutes, a silver SUV goes by yelling "Tim Steck" out the window. Now we are tired, very tired. After they go by, I comment that car was yelling for you and just look at Tim. So I chase them down and they take us to the car. We all sign all the various paperwork; get a bit of history on the car, the seller takes our check and goes to work. So there we are, on the side of some highway in a parking lot of a deserted store front, who knows where in New Jersey, with a car that we know almost nothing about. It has good tires, a new battery and looks pretty good. We get out our map and guess which way to go to get to the south bound freeway to go to the New Jersey shore. You can't go all the way there and not go to the beach.

Tim is driving, I'm navigating and he knows for absolutely positively certain that we are going the wrong direction. We almost have an argument. We manage to find our way to the beach, have a nice stroll in the surf on an almost deserted beach. We go searching for a souvenir

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shop to buy a T-shirt for our daughter. An hour later, after driving by much million dollar real estate, a U-turn right in front of a cop who nicely gives us directions, we find our shop and buy one t-shirt that says New Jersey Shore. By this time the beach is packed. New Jersey beaches are very nice at 7:30 in the morning.

We headed west. The plan is to spend the night with Tim's parents in western Pennsylvania, visit some and then drive straight through to Cottage Grove. We filled the gas tank after leaving the beach and are nearing 100 miles of travel and the gas gauge has not moved. It's still way above the full line. I hope it works, I would hate to run out of gas this far from home. Finally around 150 miles it starts to drop down. Ok, the gas gauge works. We keep driving and watching the miles add up and up and the gas gauge just creeps down. We got 450 miles on the first tank of gas and stopped for a refill at ½ tank. We are getting 33 mpg. We are feeling more pleased with the car.

Well, we do have to stop at the outlet mall just 20 minutes from his parent's house. It was huge, totally awesome. We have a really nice visit with his parents and they marvel at our trust and faith in people (they really think we are crazy, but too nice to say so). Go shopping for a few hours and at 8pm on Friday evening, we finally officially head home from western Pennsylvania. I drive for the first leg, thru a whopping thunder and lightning storm in Ohio. We keep our speed down across Oregon. Driving a car with New Jersey plates made us a bit nervous about pushing the speed limit. We can tell we are getting terrific mileage. By the time we get home in the early afternoon on Sunday, we still have a half tank of gas. Filling up the next day and computing the mileage, we got 40 miles a gallon. Wow!!!! From a V-6 engine. I guess it does help not running an air conditioner.

What a trip, 47 hours of driving with only a 4 hour stop. Only stopping for breakfast and dinner and bathroom breaks. I'd do it again, we had fun, we enjoyed the time with only each other for company and I got to put my feet in the Atlantic Ocean.

Now the hard part begins, making this car into a "real" race car!!
