My "80's" Rebuild by Alicia Andrews

I knew this year was going to be exciting but it proved to be more eventful than I thought. We have been working on a Starion we picked up a few years ago. This year we were really starting to see it come together...and then there was Ice Breaker. The event proved to be fun. The car was starting to hook up better and I really felt like I was getting faster with it. Then my husband decided on his last run to change the rev limiter. I thought, he is in big trouble if he breaks anything. He came back and everything seemed fine until we got home. He pulled into the garage and just before he turned it off he gave me that look. He told me he thought he heard a knocking noise. We waited until the car cooled down and started it up again. Sure enough, there was a knocking noise. This was the beginning to a long project.

We promptly began removing everything from the motor we could. Drained the fluids, disconnected vacuum lines, cut out a bunch of zip ties and got the car up on blocks. We dropped the tranny and everything looked intact. Next, we took off the oil pan to begin examination of what we thought

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was the true root of our problem. One by one, we pulled off the rod caps. The rod bearings were looking rather worn but not noise makers. Then on the #2 cylinder we found the victim; no bearing dropped with the cap. Once found, it wasn't a pretty picture. Not only was there no material left on the bearing but it was hammered so hard it took material off the crank and rod!

From then on it was complete disassembly. Lots of plastic cups full of nuts and bolts and very dirty parts getting bathed in brake clean. The cleaning wasn't complete until the removal of all of the aluminum flakes in the oil pump, pan and pickup. Next the block was off to the shop for further inspection.

The preliminary report was good. The crank was warped 40 thousands but was fixable. The block was solid and cylinders looked clean. When we took it apart we had discovered someone had already gone through the motor and done some work we wanted to do anyway! A balance shaft eliminator kit and new timing chain had been installed. Because of this the whole motor was to be balanced from the flywheel to the front pulley. It was going to be a practically a new motor!!

Seven weeks later, the motor was back from the shop and all the parts were here. When it came time to start putting it back together it seemed a much longer process than disassembly. We painted the block and a few other accessory parts. Everything was cleaned and de-greased. After many pots of coffee and a case of brake clean the motor was ready to go in the car.

Getting the motor in was a small battle but it was finally in!! From there it went really fast. Slapped the tranny back in, found a home for all of the bolts, and started putting in the fluids. Then after working out a few bugs it was time to start it up. My son, who is completely obsessed with the car, and I were the honorary start crew while my husband made the final adjustments under the hood. Once everything was set she was ready for the road. My husband drove it around town a couple of times to test it out. We then decided to take it out for a longer trip. We took it up to Woodburn to watch the Import Face Off drag races. It was the longest trip we had made in the car. It was a fun drive and it was great to watch my friend who inspired my interest in turbo cars make a great run! It really brought everything together to bring the car to the drag races.

The drag strip is where I learned I had a passion for fast cars and my friend has helped us along the way getting the Starion road worthy. There are many people I would like to thank for help along the way. Thank you Dave Halladey for your constant support(and for selling us the car), to Jeff Bush for all your help with putting it all together, Roger Tobias for the seat and the make it sound cool blow off valve, Andy at CarQuest for your awesome machine work, and of course my husband who really put it all together but let me be a part of it all and taught me everything I know about cars!!!

Final touches to the car include some awesome numbers from Halli Williams and Catherine Reed and a sticker I found on eBay that I couldn't pass up.

It's a Starion warning sticker that says, "Driver of this vehicle is a STARION FANATIC. This is demonstrated by the driver's persistence to drive a car that scream's 80's...." Come check out the car to see how it ends!!
